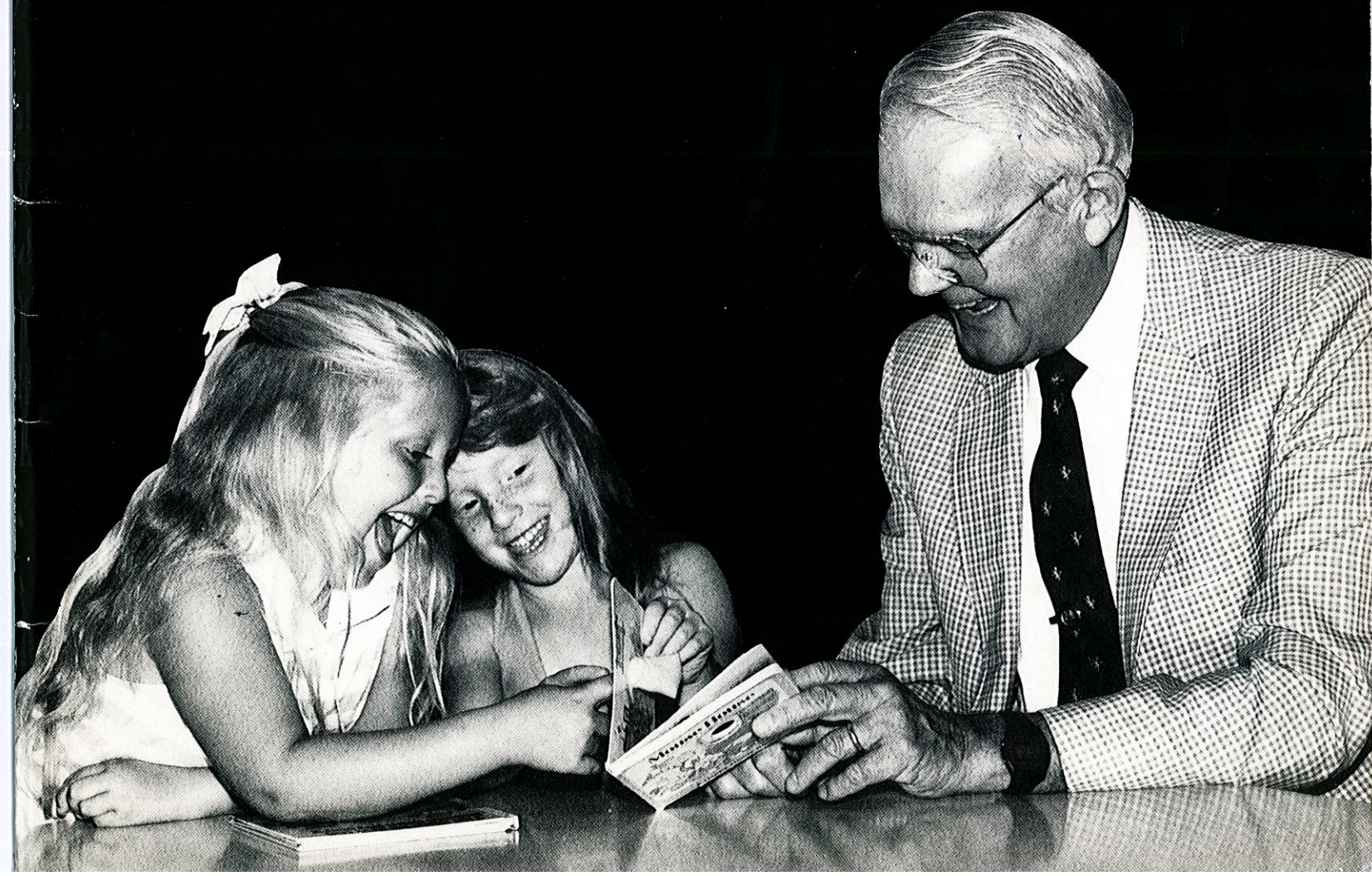

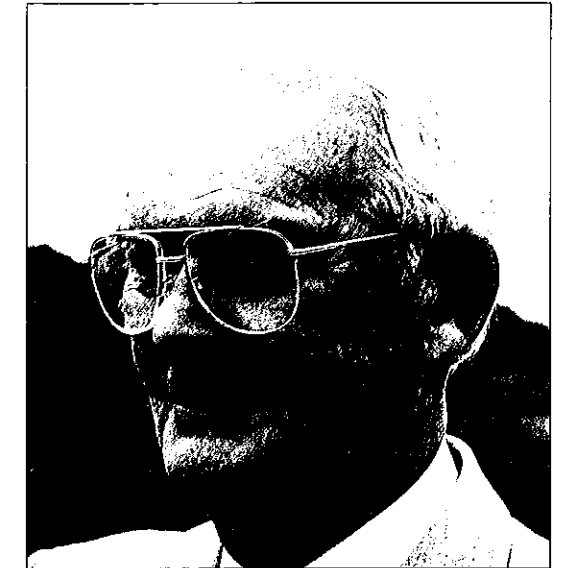
For the past six years, the West Virginia Education Fund has been very successful working with the public school systems throughout the state to enhance our educational system. When we began, we set goals. In many of our programs, we have not only attained but shattered those goals.

For example, when the Partnerships in Education program was established five years ago, we hoped for 4-5 partnerships. In our first year, we were ecstatic that 14 schools were paired with businesses. This year, more than 500 of the state's 1,083 public schools participate in the Partnership program, and 16 of our counties have 100% participation in these valuable associations. Partnerships help reduce the isolation of the schools from the business community, and through them, we can give students a better picture of the world of work and the preparation they need for success. The student's exposure to the business world can only help ensure a bright future for our state.

This program is not, by any means, our only success story. Details of our other outstanding accomplishments are included in this report.

The West Virginia Education Fund can trace its success, in part, to its commitment to teamwork. The list of contributors includes individuals, small companies, large corporations and foundations, and for all of them, we are grateful. The Fund's volunteer Board of Directors and committees comprise individuals from all walks of life who unselfishly give of their time. Their unique perspectives are essential to the continued growth and development of the Fund's impact upon the future of West Virginia. And, of course, this teamwork is all brought together by the exceptional staff, headed by Vivian Kidd.

# OVERVIEW

Throughout West Virginia, people are joining in a new commitment to our schools. This remarkable level of cooperation comes at a crucial time in our state's history, a time when the economy has made it very difficult to keep pace with the needs of schools. Yet, West Virginia's businesses and communities have rallied to support public education through the programs of the West Virginia Education Fund. Their enthusiasm is an inspiration for other states that are now using the West Virginia Education Fund as a model for developing private sector support for public education.

Incorporated in July 1983, the West Virginia Education Fund is the nation's first statewide public education fund and the first to serve a predominantly rural area. Its growth and effectiveness in terms of public school improvement have been extraordinary. This effort is extremely important to our state because quality education pays substantial dividends through employability, increased production, and the personal satisfaction of individuals.

The organization is supported by donations from individuals, organizations, businesses, corporations, and foundations. Gifts are tax deductible and greatly appreciated. The Fund has consistently operated



its programs with less than ten percent being used for management and overhead. Thus, it is also a good investment.

Recognizing that educating youth really is everyone's responsibility and to everyone's benefit, the West Virginia Education Fund provides a mechanism through which the private sector can work for improvement for the schools, while teachers, staffs, and school administrators work for improvement in the schools. As a broker working outside, but on behalf of, public schools and the students and staffs in them, the West Virginia Education Fund helps assure a public collaboration designed to raise the quality of public education in our state. The programs of the Education Fund help to remind us that schools are not run primarily for their patrons, or for parents, or for the bureaucracy. They are run for the children for the future well-being of us all.

# GRANTS PROGRAMS

**Minigrants for Classroom Projects** are small cash awards offered to public school teachers on a competitive basis to support their innovative ideas for projects to benefit the students, but for which there are no public funds available.

In the six years of the program, the Education Fund has awarded a total of \$272,748.73 to teachers for 1,078 classroom projects. These awards recognize teachers' commitment and dedication, and give them a chance to test their new ideas. Parents, community members, business and civic leaders, and others become involved in education through these projects, and learn more about our education system.



Teachers report that the effects of the Minigrant projects often continue over a period of years. Principals and superintendents have indicated that there is a magic about a Minigrant that has a positive effect on the learning environment of the entire school.

Over the years, we have learned that competitive grant opportunities encourage people to think hard about education issues, and even when they are not awarded a grant, they often carry out their projects through other means.



**Parental Involvement Awards** are competitive awards to encourage educators and community members to work together on school-based projects to encourage parents to become more involved in the education of their children. These awards, sponsored by **Union Carbide Corporation**, often support projects that involve parents as co-learners with their children. These awards are up to \$1,000 each.

Parental involvement is a proven method of increasing student achievement, and it is a sure way of enhancing parental support in the governance and advocacy of education. Numerous national reports have stated that support to enhance parent involvement is the most cost-effective strategy available to policy makers seeking to improve schools. Yet, many people, when thinking about the involvement of parents, think of bake sales and chaperoning field trips.

Parental Involvement Awards are intended to encourage the support of learning activities at home, volunteering in the school building in the academic experiences of the children, and becoming involved in governance and advocacy. We should not assume that all parents have the skills needed to support learning activities in the home, but all parents do have the capacity to develop the skills necessary to be involved in the education of their children. Schools can help to cultivate parental participation in learning activities at home and at school.

**"Think College" Grants**, part of the College Bound Program, provide funds for educators to conduct school-based projects to encourage students to consider college as part of their futures. Funded by the **West Virginia Insurance Coalition**, "Think College" Grants provide amounts up to \$1,000 to support these projects.

West Virginia's economic future depends, in large measure, upon having a well educated work force. Statistics indicate that we have not sufficiently encouraged college attendance among high school graduates. These small grants are intended to provide incentives for local initiatives to penetrate the cultural, attitudinal, and financial barriers to attending college.

# PARTNERSHIPS IN EDUCATION

The West Virginia Education Fund serves as a broker to link individual businesses or other community organizations with individual schools for a cooperative, mutually beneficial relationship. The program, called Partnerships in Education, combines the energies and resources of the partners to enhance the educational and social development of the students. Partnerships foster special bonds of cooperation and mutual respect between schools, businesses and other groups, and communities, and provide a means for schools to benefit from local resources and talents. The program also builds a broad constituency for quality public school education and enlightened advocacy for improvement.

The objectives of the program are:

- To bring business people into the schools to work with the students, teachers, and administrators on projects which school people believe will be helpful and business people feel qualified to accomplish;
- To give students and teachers a realistic picture of the business world and of the preparation students need for success;
- To supplement classroom studies with relevant learning experiences in business and industry; and,
- To give business people an understanding of the education system, how it works, its strengths and its problems.

Over 500 of the state's public schools are involved with a business or community organization in the Partnerships in Education Program. Over 15 county school systems can boast full participation in the program, having each of their schools matched with a local business or community partner.

Rather than seeking financial help, partners focus on obtaining human resources and expertise to enhance the academic learning experiences of the students. Principals have reported substantial positive changes in the learning environments of their schools that they attribute to their business partner.

Many partnerships have developed successful programs by combining specialized activities for select groups of students with more extensive, ongoing programs designed to affect a larger number of students. Among the many success stories that have occurred in the state through this program, the following are just a few examples:

- **Junior Philanthropists**—Through perfect attendance, behavior and completed homework assignments, the students at one Morgantown elementary school earned money for a contribution to Children's Hospital with the help of their business partner, a local bank.
- **Lunch with a Banker**—In another school-bank partnership, outstanding students in each grade at a Parkersburg elementary school have lunch with bank employees who visit the school frequently. A local fast food restaurant voluntarily supplies the food, and students learn from the bank employees.
- **Sixth Grade Stock Market**—Students at a rural school learned how to play the stock market when the plant manager from their business partner conducted monthly sessions at the school. Each child began with a make-believe bankroll of \$1,000 to invest. Monitoring their investments in the local paper and in the *Wall Street Journal*, students became so good at investing that the plant manager began similar sessions with teachers and employees.

- **High School Business**—A West Hamlin business provides a unique learning experience. The students, through the partnership, are forming a corporation that will market a patented quick-disconnect garden hose attachment that is manufactured in Lincoln County. The project provides practical experience in running a business, with the profits being turned over to the school. The students also plan to do a demographic study of the county for future economic development purposes.



- **Healthy Heart Report Card**—A special grade card was developed by a Lewis County hospital and its junior high school partner as the culmination of a program on heart disease and risk factors. Students rated themselves and their families on habits of diet, exercise and tobacco use. Prizes were awarded to the families showing outstanding achievement.
- **Rewards for Achievement**—Students with outstanding improvement in their academic achievement are rewarded by being picked up at school in a chauffeur-driven limousine and taken to a world-class West Virginia resort, with which the school is a partner, for lunch with the resort's executives. Other business partners provide publicity, badges, prizes and other incentives for high-achieving students, and for students with significant improvement.

- **Career Awareness**—"Shadow Days," during which students accompany for a day employees in jobs in which the students have interest, are popular as career awareness activities among partnerships. Companies are also providing classroom speakers that help children understand career opportunities and requirements. Mock job interviews, tours of company facilities, career fairs, and other activities conducted by partners are helping children gain a better picture of the world of work.
- **Mentoring**—A number of business and community partners are providing for their schools volunteers who will serve as mentors and role models for students. These adult volunteers help students understand the need to stay in school and to continue their education beyond high school. They provide friendship and a positive influence for children who may not have other encouragement outside the school.

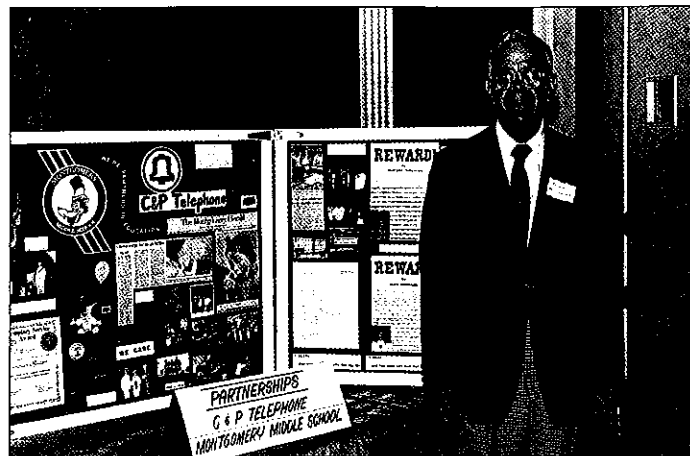
This list of activities could go on and on, but space will not allow it. The Education Fund publishes a newsletter dedicated to sharing ideas and successes such as these among the state's schools and businesses involved in the Partnerships in Education Program.

The Education Fund recruits business partners, and working with the county school superintendents, links them with the appropriate schools. The Fund also provides special conferences and other events to develop and nurture a network of information and interaction among program participants.

The second Partnerships in Education Symposium, sponsored by the Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation, was held September 29-30, 1988. This event featured nationally recognized speakers on school-business collaboration, concurrent workshops led by experienced volunteers on a variety of partnerships topics, and a display area, called "Consultants for Free," that packed a room with materials, information, and people to share ideas. A book summarizing the speakers' remarks and the workshops was distributed to all participants, and copies are available upon request until the supply is exhausted.



Since this program began in 1984, we have seen some reduction in the isolation of the schools from their communities, the development of a broader constituency of support for public education, a better understanding in many communities about the strengths and challenges of the schools, and the leveraging of some new community financial and non-financial resources on behalf of local schools.

Resource Partners are developing in some areas of the state where all schools in a county are already linked with a business or other community partner. Starting in Wood County, and spreading to other areas, the Resource Partners activity provides a way for small businesses or other community groups to become involved with local schools on an as-needed basis. Typically, a directory is published and distributed to the schools, and lists what resources are available and how to contact the appropriate parties. It is important to note that this project has been successful **only** where there are already active partners for all schools in the county.

The College Bound Program was started through a three-year grant from **Consolidated Natural Gas Foundation** in 1987. As the program has developed, other funding sources have supported expansion of this program to encourage more of West Virginia's high school graduates to attend college or pursue other post-secondary education. Raising the academic achievement level of our population is expected to enhance the state's economic future, and provide personal satisfaction and rewards to our people.

The program's efforts include:

- Identifying and lessening financial, attitudinal, and other barriers, real or perceived, that affect parents' and students' decisions about college attendance;
- Functioning as a convener of parties around this issue, and a clearinghouse and resource for educators, students, parents, and community and business members; and,
- Increasing and enhancing awareness about our changing economic base and promoting realistic avenues for students to prepare successfully for the future.

**The West Virginia College Sort**, a special computer program developed by Mr. Joseph Lupia and donated to the Education Fund, provides detailed information on each of West Virginia's public and private colleges and universities. It includes a directory of institutions, their programs, costs, campus



characteristics, and activities. It includes letters for the students to fill out requesting academic bulletins and application forms. If information is requested, for example, on a specific major, the program will provide a listing of all West Virginia schools offering that major or minor course of study. The computer program has been distributed at no cost to all of the state's high schools. Mr. Lupia has updated the program each year based on information provided by the catalogs of the state's colleges and universities.

**"A Day on Campus"**, funded by **Ashland Oil, Inc.**, provides the opportunity for schools to take students in grades four through nine to visit a college or university campus in West Virginia. Funds are available on a first-come, first-served basis to

help the public schools pay for transportation or other costs of the visit.

Every college and university in the state has agreed to participate in the program, and they all offer meaningful and memorable activities to acquaint the children with college life and opportunities. A directory of these activities has been distributed to the schools, and includes procedures for requesting funds, activities and contact people at each college.

More than 8,000 students in grades four through nine have visited West Virginia campuses as a result of "A Day on Campus." Teachers report that students have begun to talk about attending college, and are drawing parallels between their studies and what they will need to know to succeed in college.

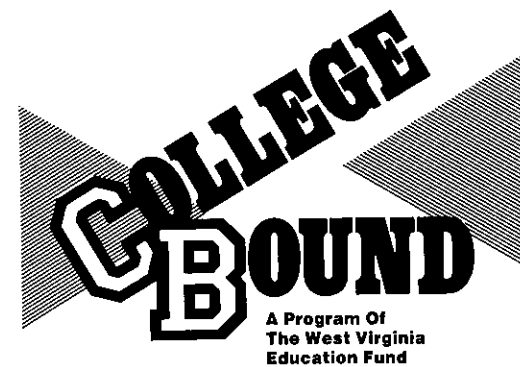
The West Virginia Scholarship Directory is a response to the need to get students in touch with the providers of private sector scholarships. Over the past few years, the Education Fund has heard from educators and students who express frustration that there is insufficient financial aid available for students who want to attend college. At the same time, we heard from business people that their companies offer scholarships for which no one applied. In an effort to get the parties together, the Fund has developed a directory of private sector scholarship information which has been distributed to the state's high schools, and to others requesting the information. The West Virginia Roundtable assisted in this effort, and *The State Journal* ran an ad for the Education Fund to help gather the information. Over 300 scholarships have been identified, and are summarized in the directory.

We believe that the identification of these scholarships will help more students take advantage of the aid available to them, thereby making it possible for them to attend college.

"Think College" Grants, described under the "Grants" portion of this report, are available to educators and community members to conduct innovative school-based projects to encourage college attendance.

*"Working to remove the regional and cultural barriers that keep students from attending college is one of our primary focuses. College Bound was designed to address those barriers and make higher education a reasonable goal for able West Virginians. Through activities like 'A Day on Campus,' the West Virginia College Sort, the Scholarship Directory, and 'Think College' grants, awareness of college is growing."*

# NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

JUNE 30, 1989

## NOTE 1—SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

**GENERAL**—The West Virginia Education Fund, Inc. (the Fund) was established in 1983 as a nonstock corporation under the laws of the State of West Virginia and is classified by the Internal Revenue Service as a tax-exempt organization under the provisions of Code Sec. 501(c)(3). The primary purpose of the West Virginia Education Fund, Inc. is to advance the quality of public education in West Virginia schools.

The various programs of the Fund consist of Classroom Minigrants, Partnerships in Education, Outstanding Educator Merit Awards and College Bound. The Classroom Minigrants program awards grants to deserving teachers to support their innovative projects for which funding would otherwise be unavailable. In the Partnerships in Education programs, schools and businesses or other private sector organizations work together for a cooperative, mutually beneficial relationship. The Outstanding Educator Merit Award program is designed to recognize outstanding teachers and principals serving grades kindergarten through twelve. The College Bound program was established to encourage more high school graduates to attend college or other post secondary training. The Fund also provides a discretionary fund for the State's superintendent of schools. Funding for these programs is principally by gifts and grants from individuals, corporations, foundations, and others.

**FURNISHINGS AND EQUIPMENT**—Donated furnishings and equipment are not recorded by the Fund, due to the insignificance of dollar amount and the difficulty of determining value. Purchased furniture and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

**GRANTS AND AWARDS**—Grants and awards are recorded as expense in the period in which they are approved by the Board of Directors. Grants payable at year end consist of grants approved and awarded but not disbursed. Refunds of the unexpended portion of grants are netted against expense in the period the refunds are received.

**EXPENDABLE RESTRICTED RESOURCES**—Gifts or grants restricted by the donor, grantor, or other outside party for particular purposes are deemed to be earned and reported as revenues when expenditures in compliance with the specific restrictions have been incurred. Prior to meeting specified restrictions, such gift or grant revenue is deferred.

**PLEDGES**—Legally enforceable pledges are recorded as receivables in the year made. Pledges for support of current operations are recorded as revenue. Pledges for support of future operations are recorded as deferred revenue. If the donor does not specify which period is being supported, revenue is recognized when payments are scheduled to be received.

**FUNCTIONAL ALLOCATION OF EXPENSES**—The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of revenue and support, expenses, and changes in fund balance. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

The 10% note is payable in monthly installments of \$356, including interest, until May 1990. Interest expense was \$563 in 1989 and \$980 in 1988. The note is secured by an automobile with a carrying value of \$3,615 at June 30, 1989. Principal amount maturing in 1990 is \$3,766.

## NOTE 3—PENSION PLAN

As of January 1, 1985, the Fund established a defined contribution pension plan for all full-time employees. Monthly contributions equal to 8% of an employee's monthly compensation are required under the Plan. Contributions are funded as accrued. Total expense was \$10,408 for 1989 and \$10,181 for 1988.
