- Advance improvement of West Virginia's education system through vision setting, dialogue and advocacy.



### Education Alliance WV Ready Graduate

The WV Ready Graduate initiative is a collaboration between The Education Alliance and Leadership West Virginia and funded by grants from the Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation and the Roy and Gwen Steeley Foundation. The initiative provides a "portrait" or "snapshot" of a WV Ready Graduate outlining the knowledge and skill sets high school graduates need to be successful. Over the past year a working group, made up of business and education leaders from around the state studied current business hiring and, promotion criteria, college admissions requirements, as well as other research to develop a clear picture of the needed skill sets. Additionally, the Alliance has supported three WV school districts to implement the WV Ready Graduate and use it as a launch pad to make big shifts within their system.

### **Education Alliance WV Ready Summer Internships**

This year, The Education Alliance also launched the WV Ready Summer Internship pilot: a 4 week, paid summer internship opportunity for rising high school Juniors and Seniors within West Virginia businesses. The 2019 pilot placed a total of 10 interns at Toyota Motor Manufacturing WV (Buffalo, WV), Appalachian Power (Charleston, WV), and Cabell Huntington Hospital (Huntington, WV). The interns participated in a day-long training in May that focused on soft-skill development, weekly virtual cohort meetings throughout their internship period, and completed a final presentation on their internship experience at the conclusion of their internship. Upon completion of all required internship responsibilities, the students were eligible to receive college credit from Mountwest Community and Technical College. The Education Alliance intends to expand the internship program next year with the goal of going statewide in the coming years.

## **Education Alliance College Visits**

Beginning in 2019, The Education Alliance secured a grant to allow students from 25 West Virginia Middle Schools to visit in-state colleges. A recent study shows that students who visit college campuses early are more likely to go to college. The purpose of these visits was to increase those odds even further by teaching students about the colleges in their area, what those colleges offered in their courses, and what criteria were required to attend. Student survey data showed that the students learned more about the programs that interested them and 17% of students considered themselves more likely to attend the college they visited.

### **Education Alliance Dialogue**

Through our public dialogue initiatives, The Education Alliance seeks to cultivate systemic improvement in West Virginia's Education system by connecting community members with up-to-date education news and policy information and by providing research on important issues facing the system. Over the past year, The Education Alliance provided real-time and in-depth coverage of the 2019 Legislative Session, West Virginia Board of Education actions, and other education-related news. The Alliance believes that public education is strongest when input from all stakeholders is valued and partners feel welcome to engage in the process. Our students and state deserve an active and engaged public.



### West Virginia Education Summit


On October 17, 2018, more than 200 business, community, and education leaders gathered in Charleston for the West Virginia Education Summit to discuss how student-centered learning can improve student achievement. The highlight of the event was the keynote provided by Tom Rooney, Superintendent of the Lindsay Unified School District, who shared lessons learned and evidence-based strategies to prepare students academically, socially, and emotionally for future success. ### **EDTalks**

EDTalks is a statewide speaker series that features innovative thought leaders who share big ideas about how we can work together to develop students who are WV Ready. The Education Alliance launched the EDTalks Initiative in 2014 and proudly host two regional events each spring. The 2019 EDTalks events were held in Beckley and Wheeling. The EDTalks featured presentations from Dan D'Antoni, Marshall University Men's Basketball Coach; The Honorable Amy Shuler Goodwin, Mayor of Charleston WV; Dr. Brad Price, West Virginia University Assistant Professor; Jada Reeves, 2019 West Virginia Teacher of the Year; Faith Richter, Senior at Wheeling Park High School; and Dr. Sarah Armstrong Tucker, Chancellor of the WV Community and Technical College System. This year's EDTalks were sponsored by Northwood Health Systems, Bowles Rice, Cucumber & Company Inc., Dow, RED: Regional Economic Development, United Bank, West Virginia University College of Business and Economics, and partners New River Community and Technical College, and Ohio County Schools.

# **Born Learning Academy**

The Born Learning Academy, funded by Toyota Motor Manufacturing West Virginia, Inc. and the Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation, creates opportunities for families of young children to connect with local schools during the critical period of early learning prior to school enrollment. As part of the program, families participate in six engaging academies where they learn how to create teachable moments with their children. This year, nearly 200 parents and caregivers from 11 schools came together to participate in hands-on activities and discussions about what it means to be ready for kindergarten and how they can implement strategies to maximize their child's early learning and development. The Born Learning Academy is continuing to empower families to create a better future for their children.




# **Education Alliance Blended Learning**

Education Alliance Blended Learning helps teachers in seven rural West Virginia schools "blend" face-to-face instruction with online resources to provide engaging, technology-rich learning opportunities for students. Face-to-face instruction is enhanced with Makerspaces that enable hands-on, project-based learning. Participating teachers blend digital instruction using a Learning Management System platform to organize and create content that enhances STEM learning. The Blended Learning initiative is funded through generous contributions from the BelleJAR Foundation, Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation, Chevron, and Ross Foundation.

# **Education Alliance STEM VISTA**

Education Alliance STEM VISTA focuses on enhancing STEM education in West Virginia in a number of ways: providing high quality professional development opportunities for teachers; engaging students in STEM centered educational offerings; and partnerships between schools and STEM business partners in their communities. STEM VISTAs build the organizational, administrative, and financial capacity of public schools by developing resources to implement and enhance the scalability of STEM efforts across the state. The STEM VISTA project is made possible through a generous contribution from the Corporation for National and Community Service.

# Education Alliance AmeriCorps Mentors


Education Alliance AmeriCorps Mentors is a dropout prevention mentor-based intervention that addresses student attendance, behavior, and course performance. This program enables 40 AmeriCorps mentors to provide more than 17,000 mentoring sessions to 775 at-risk students in grades 3-12. These sessions help students develop positive attitudes towards school and learning, problem solving, social skills, note taking, homework help and time management. Mentors leveraged the support of 450 community volunteers from local business and community organizations to engage students in job-shadowing activities and extended learning opportunities. Major funding for this program was provided by the Corporation for National & Community Service and Volunteer West Virginia with support from the Fenton Foundation, the Parkersburg Area Foundation, and the Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation.



## **Education Alliance Energizing steM**

Education Alliance Energizing steM uses a two-part approach to strengthen math in elementary grades and to promote the importance of math to the broader community. The project provides 2,000 elementary students in Lincoln and Logan counties with an effective computer-based supplemental curriculum called Imagine Math to improve math outcomes over a three-year period. The Energizing steM project promotes a greater public understanding of the need for STEM, builds STEM career awareness, and provides a specific focus on the critical role of building strong Math skills. The Education Alliance partnered with the Regional Educational Laboratory – Appalachia (REL AP) to offer community math nights that engage family members in supporting their child's math learning. This initiative was made possible through a generous contribution from American Electric Power Foundation.

## **Education Alliance Financial Literacy**

The Education Alliance Financial Literacy program is a tool for educators, students, and families to strengthen Financial Literacy. The makecentswv.org website was launched in 2017 and has since served as a "clearinghouse" for resources to promote wise, informed financial choices, as well as developing new lesson plans that have helped 140 students increase saving, and improve credit. During the 2018-19 school year, three schools received funding and support to conduct a self-assessment of existing financial literacy programs and practices. Based on those results, they received training, support, and resources to strengthen their students' personal finance skills.
