MISSION DELIVERABLES AND IMPACT

The Education Alliance is a statewide non-profit organization that mobilizes business and community support for public schools. We are passionate about helping ensure all West Virginia students graduate high school READY for success.

Founded in 1983, we are proud of our **<u>Historic Impact</u>**:

- 1984 Launched Partnerships in Education program that links West Virginia schools with business partners.
- 1982 Adopted Read Aloud and expanded it statewide to teach children the joy of reading.
- 2012 Initiated AmeriCorps Mentor program to match caring adult role models with high need students.
- 2014 Trademarked EDTalks to foster dialogue between business and community leaders to strengthen public education.
- 2018- Developed the profile of a West Virginia Ready Graduate Profile to provide a clear picture of the knowledge, skills, and characteristics students need for success.

In the past decade, The Education Alliance has a track record of **Innovative Impact:**

- Galvanized West Virginia's STEM Initiative STEM programming in low-scoring districts resulted in 9% to 24% increase in math proficiency over three years.
- Jumpstarted Blended Learning (3 years before pandemic) Educators saw 38% to 93% increase in capacity to blend "face-to-face" instruction with online learning.
- Forged Partnerships with Leading Businesses High school students report a 100% increase in career readiness through Internships with Toyota, Appalachian Power, Dow, WV American Water, Rockwool, CAMC and others.

In the 2021 spring semester, Jacob enrolled in the WV Ready Work-Based Learning Virtual Internship course during his senior year of high school. Each week, he participated in the high quality, virtual job shadow training modules offered by Toyota, Dow, WV American Water, Charleston Area Medical Center, Bowles Rice, Encova, Rockwool, AEP, Yeager Airport, and many other businesses. *"They're fantastic!"* he said enthusiastically.

In addition, Jacob's class was matched with one business, Appalachian Power, to develop a capstone project on "power service installation for a barn in Culloden." To support the capstone, AEP team members joined weekly mentoring calls and during one mentoring session, Jacob asked the AEP engineers – "*Is AEP involved with the power hook up for our new high school building that is under construction*?" To which the engineers replied "*Yes, would you like to learn about that*?" The next week, the AEP engineers took this teachable moment and provided Jacob's entire class with a "behind the scenes look" at all of the electrical systems plans for their new high school building. He said '*I loved the real-world learning!*"

In **2018**, The Education Alliance convened a working group comprised of 16 key business and education leaders from across the state to guide the development of the West Virginia Graduate Profile. The working group reviewed hiring and promotion criteria used by West Virginia businesses as well as tools/metrics used for assessing those criteria. The result was a clear, concise vision document called the **WV Ready Graduate Profile that outlines the knowledge, skills, and characteristics students need for success** after graduation.

In **2019**, we translated that vision into action and launched the innovative **high school Summer Internship Program**. The program recruited students from diverse backgrounds to minimize socioeconomic, gender, and rural barriers. It provided paid internships with transformational mentoring/work-based learning opportunities in the state's top industries of health care, manufacturing, and energy.

In **2020**, due to the pandemic, the program transitioned to a virtual summer internship experience in which high school students received **weekly training modules, business mentoring, and completed a capstone project** using a digital Learning Management System (LMS). By adding the virtual component, more highneed students (previously unable to participate due to rurality or lack of transportation) gained access.

This year, in Spring of **2021**, the Education Alliance integrated the program within the school day through a **Virtual Work-Based Learning Internship course** that provided high school credit. The program grew from 3 businesses to 13, and from 10 students to more than 100, all in the midst of a global pandemic. The ultimate aim is to expand access to career readiness opportunities to all West Virginia students through a robust talent pipeline in which businesses and schools collaborate to develop WV Ready Graduates.

The WV Ready Internship consists of two primary components: Weekly Job Shadowing Training Modules, and Capstone Projects supported by mentoring. Together, these components create an experience that enables students to broaden their career awareness and gain a deeper understanding of the life skills needed for career readiness.

COLLEGE VISITS

FOR MIDDLE SCHOOLS

In order to meet future workforce needs, West Virginia Climb established a statewide college attainment goal of **60% of West Virginians with a certificate or degree by 2030**. Research is clear, in order to meet this goal we need to start early and have conversations about careers and college in middle school.

In Spring 2021, with a grant from the WV Higher Education Policy Commission, the Alliance supported 1-hour Virtual College Visits for Middle School students. The WVU Potomac State visit provides a great "snapshot" of a typical visit. The college Admission Coordinators started the virtual visit with a fun video of "Paws" their campus mascot. They talked to the students about how college life is different than high school with less time in class but more outside homework.

They used their webcam to look inside a typical dorm room and the college cafeteria. They even showcased their college "E-sports" program where school teams compete in video game competitions just like traditional sports. The students asked many questions and thoroughly enjoyed the visit. They also learned about the financial aid that is available to them and the Potomac State counselors encouraged them to start thinking about college now. This program no doubt helped spark a vision for many 7th graders of a brighter future here in the mountain state.

INCENTIVES AND SUPPORT

Due to the pandemic, the number of students applying to college significantly decreased in 2021. Perhaps equally devastating, financial aid applications, such as the Promise Scholarship, also initially decreased 20% in West Virginia. This means that thousands of high school seniors could miss out on more than \$115 billion in financial aid that is available to help them finance a college education.

To combat this challenge, the Alliance joined forces with the WV Higher Education Policy Commission and WV Department of Education to host a variety of initiatives. Our Cool Cash For College Contest and College Bound Saturday events gave away thousands of prizes and our College Ambassador program provided support for students and families to file the FAFSA. Combined, these efforts help close the gap by more than 29% as students took important next steps for their future.

The Caperton Center's purpose is to **develop and sustain school-business partnerships** that promote student success. The Caperton Center will focus on three primary goals:


1. REVITALIZATION:

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AMERICORPS Mentors

SUPPORT SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING

There have been substantial increases in stress and anxiety for students and adults due to the recent pandemic. There is little doubt that these struggles lead to poor academic achievement by students and decreased graduation rates. The Education Alliance developed a Social Emotional Learning Toolkit to help AmeriCorps Mentors and other individuals working with students integrate mental health best practices and strategies into their ongoing mentoring approach (http://educationalliance.org/sel/)

In Spring of 2021, Sophia, an AmeriCorps Mentor, used the Social Emotional Learning Toolkit to support her students. Sophia mentored a group of students that were full of energy. She noticed that many students had difficulty focusing in the afternoon mentoring sessions and struggled to listen and participate. One student, Emmanuel, who is slightly older than the other students, seemed especially challenging to engage and most of the mentoring techniques that Sophia tried did not resonate with him. After participating in the Toolkit training, Sophia decided to incorporate yoga after lunch to help the students refocus their minds and bodies. The students enjoyed the unique names for each pose and found the process challenging. This activity allowed the students to have fun and become reenergized after lunch. Even Emmanuel enjoyed the sessions and found it challenging enough to keep his interest. Sophia was able to develop a relationship with Emmanuel through the yoga exercise. Now the students ask to do yoga and enjoy the quiet time to refocus on their afternoon classes.









PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



EQUIPPING STUDENTS FOR SUCCESS

The Education Alliance equips West Virginia students for success through innovative education programming, mentoring, and support.

AmeriCorps Mentors: 35 AmeriCorps members provide a dropout prevention mentor-based intervention designed to improve student attendance, behavior, and course performance. Major funding provided by AmeriCorps and Volunteer West Virginia with support from the Fenton Foundation, the Pallottine Foundation of Huntington, the Parkersburg Area Foundation, and the Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation.

College Ambassadors: 9 AmeriCorps members serve at Community Colleges working to increase college access and enrollment. Major funding provided by West Virginia Community and Technical College System, AmeriCorps and Volunteer West Virginia.

West Virginia Statewide College Access Network (WVSCAN): As a member of the National College Attainment Network, WVSCAN brings together business, education, and community leaders to improve college access across the state. Under the Network, 8,000 middle school students participated in college visits, and the Cool Cash for College contest helped close the "FAFSA gap" between the 2020 and 2021 school years by 29%. Major funding provided by the WV Higher Education Policy Commission, WV Department of Education, with support from Mister Bees Potato Chips.

Financial Literacy: Statewide partnership that provides resources to help students make wise and informed financial choices.

MOBILIZING BUSINESS & COMMUNITY SUPPORT

The Education Alliance mobilizes business and community support to leverage expertise and resources that improve student outcomes.

Partnerships in Education: Recognizes school and business partnerships that produce WV Ready Graduates through an Education Alliance certificate of recognition and technical support.

Work-based Learning Internships: Offered in collaboration with West Virginia businesses, the program provides high school students with workbased learning opportunities through paid summer internships and in-school coursework for graduation credit. Major funding provided by Benedum Foundation, Steeley Foundation, Toyota Motor Manufacturing West Virginia, and American Electric Power Foundation.

WV Ready VISTA: 6 AmeriCorps Volunteer in Service to America (VISTA)'s help build capacity of schools and nonprofit organizations to develop WV Ready students equipped with knowledge and skills to be successful after high school. Major funding provided by AmeriCorps.

ADVANCING SYSTEM

The Education Alliance advances the improvement of West Virginia's education system through research-based vision setting, dialogue and advocacy.

EDTalks®: Statewide speaker-series held annually to generate innovative discussions and big ideas about connecting education, jobs and West Virginia's future. Event sponsorship provided by Toyota Motor Manufacturing West Virginia, Inc., Bowles Rice LLP, and Jackson Kelly PLLC.

WV Education Summit: Statewide education summit that engages businesses, community and education leaders in innovative dialogue and collaboration to achieve excellence in education in West Virginia. 
